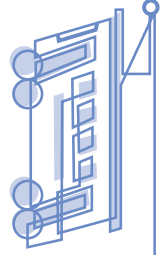

## WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

### WORKSHOP #1: SATURDAY FEBRUARY 16, 2008

#### THE MANY FACETS OF GRIEF

David Capuzzi, Ph.D., NCC, LPC

This seminar discusses grief and loss from a broad perspective to include a variety of life transitions. The stages of grief and loss, the four basic tasks of mourning, the difference between a normal grief reaction and one that is not normal, how to talk with someone experiencing a loss or transition, signs of recovery, how different subcultures in our country respond to loss, the purposes of hospice and palliative care, and the use of support groups for bereaved individuals are among the topics. This seminar encompasses the use of videos, exercises in dyads and triads, and discussion and sharing of experiences to invite participant involvement and learning.

#### *Presenter: David Capuzzi, Ph.D., NCC, LPC*

David Capuzzi, Ph.D., NCC, LPC, is Affiliate Professor in the Department of Counselor Education, Counseling Psychology, and Rehabilitation Services and Continuing and Professional Education at Pennsylvania State University. He is professor emeritus at Portland State University. He is a past president of the American Counseling Association (ACA).

Dr. Capuzzi has authored a number of textbook chapters and monographs on the topic of preventing adolescent suicide and is coeditor and author (with Dr. Larry Golden) of *Helping Families Help Children: Family Interventions with School Related Problems* (1986) and *Preventing Adolescent Suicide* (1988). He has coauthored and edited several books now in their 4th or 5th editions, including *Youth at Risk: A Prevention Resource for Counselors, Teachers, and Parents* (2004); *Introduction to the Counseling Profession* (2008); *Introduction to Group Counseling* (2006); and *Counseling and Psychotherapy: Theories and Interventions* (2007, with Douglas R. Gross). He also edited *Approaches to Group Work: A Handbook for Practitioners* (2003) and *Sexuality Counseling* (2002), the latter coauthored and edited with Larry Burlew. Two of his newest texts, *Career Counseling: Foundations, Perspectives, and Applications* (2007) and *Foundations of Addictions Counseling* (2008) were co-edited with Mark D. Stauffer. He has authored or coauthored articles in a number of ACA-related journals and has served as editor of *The School Counselor*. A frequent speaker and keynoter at professional conferences and institutes, Dr. Capuzzi has also consulted with a variety of school districts and community agencies interested in initiating prevention and intervention strategies for adolescents at risk for suicide. He has facilitated the development of suicide prevention, crisis management, and postvention programs in communities throughout the United States; provides training on the topics of youth at risk, grief and loss, group work, and using meditation and mindfulness to increase therapeutic presence in counseling; and serves as an invited adjunct faculty member at other universities. He is the first recipient of ACA's Kitty Cole Human Rights Award and also a recipient of Leona Tyler Award in Oregon.

### WORKSHOP #2: SATURDAY APRIL 26, 2008

#### SPIRITUALITY IN COUNSELING: A GUIDE TO COMPETENT AND ETHICAL PRACTICE

Craig S. Cashwell, Ph.D. and Harriet L. Glossoff, Ph.D.

Research has indicated that there is a relationship between spirituality and both physical and mental health and that over 95% of the people living in the United States believe in a higher power. In addition, spirituality has been increasingly viewed by counselors as an important component of a client's culture and development. Counselors need to be able to assess how and when spirituality and religion may play a role in the concerns that clients bring to counseling as well as how these may be used to help clients resolve their issues. This workshop will include lecture, discussion, and experiential activities related to the competent integration of spirituality into the counseling process. Focusing on mind, body, emotions, and spirit as connected, discussions will center on how to work within a psychospiritual context while adhering to ethical and legal guidelines within the counseling profession. Content also will focus on discerning when and how to implement spirituality into the counseling process, as well as contraindications for psychospiritual work.

#### *Presenters: Craig S. Cashwell, Ph.D. and Harriet L. Glossoff, Ph.D.*

Craig Cashwell is a Professor in the Department of Counseling and Educational Development at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Dr. Cashwell has authored over 70 publications on diverse topics, including parenting, multicultural counseling, substance abuse, and spirituality. He is co-editor of *Integrating Spirituality and Religion into Counseling: A Guide to Competent Practice*, published by ACA. A Licensed Professional Counselor in North Carolina and Approved Clinical Supervisor, Dr. Cashwell has worked in private practice, community agencies, and university counseling centers. He has received the Meritorious Service Award from the Association for Spiritual, Ethical, and Religious Values in Counseling (ASERVIC). He is Vice-Chair of the Board of Directors of the Council for the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) and is a Past-President for the Association for Spiritual, Ethical and Religious Values in Counseling.

Harriet Glossoff is an Associate Professor and Director of the Counselor Education program at The University of Virginia. Dr. Glossoff has given over 100 presentations and has authored over 35 publications on diverse topics with a focus on ethics, professional advocacy, multicultural counseling, and spirituality. A Licensed Professional Counselor, a National Certified Counselor, and an Approved Clinical Supervisor, Dr. Glossoff has extensive experience as a counseling supervisor and in the provision of counseling services in community agencies, in-and-out-patient psychiatric facilities, public schools (K-higher education), and private practice. She is the Immediate Past-President of the Association for Counselor Education and Supervision and past Chair of the Ethics Committee of the American

Counseling Association, the Association for Spiritual, Ethical and Religious Values in Counseling, and the Virginia Counselors Association.

### WORKSHOP #3: SATURDAY JUNE 21, 2008

#### LEGAL AND ETHICAL ISSUES IN COUNSELING

Mary Hermann, Ph.D.

This workshop will assist counselors in identifying their legal and ethical responsibilities. Topics such as the 2005 revisions of the ACA Code of Ethics, rights of minor clients, dual relationships, client suicide, clients who pose a danger to others, confidentiality, and legal and ethical issues in supervision will be addressed. Legal cases that define the liability of counselors will be discussed. Practical suggestions on practicing in an ethical manner and minimizing legal liability will be provided.

#### *Presenter: Mary Hermann, Ph.D.*

Mary A. Hermann is an Assistant Professor at Virginia Commonwealth University. She holds a J.D. degree and a Ph.D. in Counselor Education. She is a licensed attorney, a Licensed Professional Counselor, a National Certified Counselor, and a Certified School Counselor. Dr. Hermann has co-edited a book on legal and ethical issues in school counseling and written numerous journal articles and book chapters. She has served on the American Counseling Association Ethics Committee and she currently co-chairs the American School Counselor Association Ethics Committee. She regularly presents at national, regional, and state conferences.

### WORKSHOP #4: SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 13, 2008

#### NEW PERSPECTIVES ON MASCULINITY: CRITICAL ISSUES IN COUNSELING MEN

Courtland Lee, Ph.D.

The role of men is evolving in the 21st century. Men are continually grappling with issues of masculinity as they reassess their roles with women and each other. This workshop will provide participants with the awareness, knowledge and skills for effective counseling with male clients. In addition, the workshop will provide new directions for culturally competent counseling with African American men.

#### *Presenter: Courtland Lee, Ph.D.*

Dr. Courtland Lee is a Professor and Director of the Counselor Education Program at the University of Maryland, College Park. He is the author, editor, or co-editor of four books on multicultural counseling and two books on counseling and social justice. He is also the author of three books on counseling African American males. In addition, he has published numerous book chapters and articles on counseling cross cultures.

Dr. Lee is the President of the International Association for Counselling. He is also a *Fellow* of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy, the first and only American to receive this honor. Dr. Lee is a Past President of ACA. He is also a past President of the Association for Multicultural Counseling and Development. In addition, Dr. Lee is a past President of Chi Sigma

Iota, the international counseling honor society. He is a charter member of Chi Sigma Iota's Academy of Leaders for Excellence.

Dr. Lee is the former editor of the *Journal of Multicultural Counseling and Development* and the *Journal of African American Men*. He currently serves on the editorial board of the *International Journal for the Advancement of Counselling*. He is also an Associate Editor of the *Journal of Counseling and Development*.

Dr. Lee has held faculty positions as a counselor educator at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the University of Virginia. A former teacher and school counselor, Dr. Lee has served as an educational consultant in both the United States and abroad.

### WORKSHOP #5: SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2008

#### SHARING STORIES: BUILDING COMMUNITY

Michael Hutchins, Ph.D.

In this experiential workshop, participants will participate in story-telling and community building. Participants will share their own stories in small groups and a model for building a peaceful community will be developed. The American Counseling Association's *Code of Ethics and Advocacy Competencies* will provide a framework for the group experience.

#### *Presenter: Michael Hutchins, Ph.D.*

A. Michael Hutchins, Ph.D. is a licensed professional counselor in private practice in Tucson, AZ and is on staff at Cottonwood de Tucson Treatment Center. He currently works in individual and group settings with men who have histories of early childhood abuse and trauma. He has been active in human rights and social justice advocacy work throughout his career.

Dr. Hutchins has presented workshops nationally and internationally and has written in the areas of sexual identity development, personal and community trauma, social justice advocacy, human rights, and experiential and cross-cultural group work. He believes that we, as helping professionals, must continue to advocate for the rights of all community members, particularly for those in our community who are not granted access to power. He hopes to continue to work for change in the community-at-large, seeing the world as one community with diverse world views and approaches to community-building.
